Serving Our Neighbors by Sharing Our Blessings!

After two months of wonderful articles from Alan and Lauren, it's back to me! And in case you forgot, I'm still talking about how to help neighbors feel welcome the first time they visit the church. So far, I've talked about figuring out where we are right now (not many took the time to respond), building a great website (thanks to all who have put time into redesigning it!), having a welcome center (still working on that), pointing people in the right direction, and everyone being a part of the Welcome Team. This week I want us to look at **giving our guest a gift**.

Let's be honest: Nothing says "You are welcome!" like a welcome gift. Some churches go all out and hand out mugs, shirts and other church-branded merchandise. I know, we don't have the money for those types of things (yet). We can at least have a welcome pamphlet explaining the vision of the church, introducing the pastor, and maybe a \$5 Dunkin or Starbucks gift card. The welcome gift doesn't have to be expensive; the gesture goes a long way.

As you know, I worshipped at a lot of churches over the summer. The two that are the most memorable for me helped me feel welcomed when I walked in. At one, Carla and I were greeted at the door and given a cloth gift bag with simple things: a can cozy, pencil, and a notepad, all with the church's name on them (including the bag). With the other, as I walked out the door the pastor (who didn't know I was coming) handed me a pen with the churches name on it plus a bag of microwave popcorn. The popcorn had a label on it that said, "Things are popping at [church name]!" The label also had contact info on it. I gave the gift bag back at the first church but kept the gifts from the second one (they're in my office if you want to see them). Both churches had simple, inexpensive items that helped me feel like I was indeed welcome in their church.

There are so many ways we can give guests a gift depending on our budget. Giving our guests a gift as they walk in has the added benefit of identifying who the first-time guests are to our members. If you see anyone walking around with a gift bag or bag of popcorn, you know they are a visitor. Now you can go and introduce yourself.

Not one church I visited got it right on everything that I've talked about thus far. Some didn't do any of the things. But the ones I felt most welcomed at did do several of them. I do hope that Resurrection can fall into the latter group.

In case you haven't heard (i.e., you haven't listened to any of my sermons in September), my time away opened my eyes to some changes that God is calling us to make at RLC. You'll now hear me say regularly that, after decades of focusing on money and members, we need to focus on **message**, **mission**, **and ministry**. To break that down, that's: sharing the message that God loves all of us; living out the mission that God has called us to; and doing ministry beyond our walls with help from people beyond our walls. That last one will be crucial to the expanding witness of Resurrection to the community.

A few new things were tried at RLC this summer. I'm so thankful for folks taking the lead and trying new ministries without waiting around for me. Unfortunately, the busyness of the summer almost burned out some of the members. Some might think that means we need to not try new things since we don't have a lot of people. Jesus ran into a similar problem. But he didn't say, "OK, I need to cut back on what the disciples are doing." Instead, he said to the disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." (Matthew 9:37b-38) There are plenty of people you know or who are living in Franklin Park who might not want to come for worship, but they want to be a part of a ministry. Let's keep praying for God to send more laborers to us. And let's actively ask/seek those who want to be coworkers with us. -DTP

Outreach Food4Life Food Pantry/Clothing Closet News



In August the food pantry served 108 families which consisted of 235 adults and 84 children. We welcomed 17 new guests.

We continue to be blessed with food, clothing and miscellaneous donations from our usual sources. God continues to send donations our way. We are very grateful to those who donated items this month. We are in need of men's T-shirts, casual shirts, jeans and casual pants.

We received 53 donations from our members, companies and others in August.

We are so grateful for our volunteers. We have 23 volunteers of which 3 are not members of Resurrection. Our volunteers gave 186 hours of their time working very hard to make this ministry successful. We are still in need of additional people to pick up donations from Costco on Sunday morning.

Financial Summary August 2024

August Year to Date Income: \$6,485.34 \$57,108.55 Expenses: (\$11,861.28) (\$96,417.14) Income Shortfall: (\$5,375.94) (\$39,308.59)

August results show a gain in our investments of \$454.82. Envelope income was under budget by \$888.33 for the month & under budget \$3,815.17 for the year. Expenses were under budget by \$643.14 for the month, & under budget by \$3,618.22 for the year. Our cash position as of 8/31/24 is \$138,105.19 in total cash assets, spread across our Money Market Fund, CD, Checking Account and ELCA investment. Our envelope giving year to date is behind budget and hopefully we can make up for this shortfall in the last Quarter of the year. We had to take another \$10,000.00 from our Thrivent Money Market Fund this month to meet our expenses. Year to date we have taken \$32,500.00 out of this fund. If this continues, we will have no more money in this fund in the next 8 to 10 months. We will have to make some hard decisions very soon.
